JULY GARDENING TIPS

I thought there wouldn't be much to say about gardening in July, but I was wrong. There are nearly 100 gardens across the Cape open for your pleasure this month. Plan one day or several and take advantage of the hospitality of local gardeners.

Inspiration: **Garden Tours** will inspire you. **The Cape Cod Hydrangea Society** is sponsoring several spectacular open gardens as part of the annual Hydrangea Festival run by the Chamber of Commerce. One of the most outstanding gardens is right here in **Falmouth**. Open on July 8 and 13, this garden, located right off of Route 28 opposite Mahoney's Garden Center, is the lifelong project of two extreme gardeners and I highly recommend it!

The Chamber of Commerce is the master coordinator of many other garden tours during its annual **Hydrangea Festival, July 6 – 15**. To see a complete list of all tours that will keep you busy for days, go to the Chamber's website:

If hydrangeas are your first love, the Cape Cod Hydrangea Society also offers its 3rd annual **Hydrangea University at Heritage Gardens, Sandwich on Friday, July 6**. Cost is \$80 with discounts for members of the Hydrangea Society. The pre-eminent horticulturist, Dr. Michael Dirr will be presenting at this year's event among other plant specialists. A day of learning and an opportunity to see the display gardens at their best.

Annuals: Deadhead. This is the single most important thing you can do to keep your container plants looking beautiful. Take along your cocktail in the evening and stroll your garden snipping or pinching off dead and dying blossoms. A whole new crop is eager to come forth. A bi-weekly dose of diluted liquid fertilizer will also pay you back in blooms.

Roses: Roses are heavy feeders and appreciate an extra dose of fertilizer now so that the autumn flowering is robust. I like Espoma's Organic Rose-tone.

Basil: even non-vegetable growers like to grow some basil plants for summer tomatoes. Here's a harvest tip: prune whole branches of basil plants, not just the leaves. This will encourage new branches and larger leaves to form.

Iris: Dig and divide bearded iris rhizomes now. Discard soft rhizomes. Make sure each division has a healthy fan of leaves attached.

Your garden's design is a living, changing thing and your plants will tell you if they are happy in their location.

Garden Share Day, Monday, July 23, Noon - 4 pm


Mark your calendars July 23, is Garden Share Day from Noon - 4 pm.

Garden Therapy

As you may know, we expanded our Garden Therapy program to include Royal Megansett Nursing facility in North Falmouth. We held our first session in late May, and it was very successful due to the time and attention of the dedicated Garden Therapy team.

Robin Ketchum has been hosting creative sessions with Royal Megansett for some time now, as her late mom was a resident there. Robin paved the way for a warm welcome on our first official day delivering an FGC Garden Therapy program. We were greeted by a room full of residents, with a few grumbling about the fact that they did not like flowers – when told who we were and why we were there. Of course, once they saw the beautiful spring-colored tissue flowers that we were going to make – they knew they had to stay. We had approx. 15 participants – with 3 being gentlemen. They were just as excited about the project.

Each resident was provided with a vase to call their own, which they would use to insert 3 flowers – colors of their choice (pink, green, yellow and orchid). The Garden Therapy team met earlier in the week to do the prep work of fan-folding the tissue paper, and attaching the soon-to-be flowers to long-stem wire to hold them up proudly in the vase. Thanks team! You could see the pride in the faces of each of the residents as they unfolded each layer to form a beautiful flower. Some needed a little help, but we had plenty of it thanks to the team. Once they were satisfied with their creations, the team helped them “layer” the flowers in the vase so that each flower could be proudly shown. We then inserted live baby’s breath into each vase to complement their creations. They were thrilled to be able to take them back to their rooms. They were very intent on making sure that their names were put on their vases – so as not to get theirs confused with anyone else’s.

The most memorable moment that I will take with me for a long time to come was a gentleman who created a vase with 3 flowers that he lovingly made all by himself – no help needed. Later on, his wife (also a resident) came to the room in her wheelchair and he presented the vase to her, and proudly said that he had made them for her. The look between the 2 of them almost brought tears to my eyes – the love that we have certainly all seen and experienced in our relationships. It was just a look – unspoken, but yet so powerful! I will never forget that special look and bond between them, sparked again as a result of our session. That is why we do what we do! We made a very special impact on their lives that day! Thank you to the Garden Therapy Team for your loving and caring support of Falmouth seniors, as always.
